*Utah has the reputation of having some quirky liquor laws. However, laws have changed. Bars are now bars. Anyone 21 and over can go into a bar and order a drink (beer, wine, cocktail, etc.). Restaurants are now restaurants, the majority of which offer alcoholic beverages to complement their fare -- beer, wine, cocktails, etc. There are several bars and social clubs just a few blocks away from the hotel. You can walk and/or order a taxi/Uber/Lyft. Here are a few places that are walking distance.*

**Where can I buy packaged alcoholic beverage products to go?** *All packaged liquor, wine and full-strength beer must be purchased from a Utah state liquor store or a package agency. Beer (with 3.2%*

alcohol content by weight) in bottles or cans may be purchased to go at most grocery and convenience stores in Utah.

**Trax Ride to Mestizo Coffeehouse**

*For an optional cultural activity, we highly recommend riding the local trax (light rail system) to Mestizo Coffeeshop in Rose Park.*

*Since 2008, Mestizo Coffeehouse opened their doors and dedicated its efforts to building a better community through art, culture and great coffee. It has already worked as a catalyst of change for many Salt Lake City high school students. “When you buy coffee from Mestizo’s, your dollar is going right back into community and youth,” we are a mixed group of artists, activists, community builders, and private investors. While offering a unique taste in fair trade organic coffees, specialty drinks, and culturally-diverse foods, the coffeehouse also offers fresh pastries and unique local samples of specialty foods—located on the corner of 600 West and North Temple inside CitiFront apartment court yard. Mestizo’s Coffeehouse shares space with its sister organization, the Mestizo Institute of Culture and Arts (MICA).*

*In addition to youth who benefit from MICA's non-profit arts and cultural mentorship programs, 20 high school students are participating in the Mestizo Arts and Activism Program (MAA). In partnership with the University Neighborhood Partners, participants of MAA meet twice a week after school to develop action research projects based on their personal and communal interest.*

*Providing community space at no charge for a huge variety of events, and voted best MOCHA and Open MIC NIGHT by City Weekly, the coffee shop is fast becoming a "Westside" destination.*

**Mestizo Coffeeshop** is approximately an 18 minute trax ride. Walk towards the "Gallivan Plaza Station" board the "Green Line" towards Airport. Get off on "North Temple/Guadalupe Station".

When you're riding the Airport TRAX Line, don't forget to take a look at the artwork at each station. Every stop features a unique piece of art designed to enhance the public transit experience and reflect the area's rich cultural and natural history. In the Jackson\Euclid station, you will be able to see and experience the magnificent art installation by Utah's own Chicana artist Rudy Chacon. It is a community collaboration between the artist Ruby Chacón, Mestizo Arts and Activism Collective and its youth researchers, Mestizo Institute of Culture and Arts, Mestizo Coffeehouse, 500+ community members, writers, and artist apprentices. The project began with youth researchers developing and distributing surveys throughout the community including the neighborhood in which this station is located. The artist apprentices analyzed the data from the surveys and created images with Chacón to translate and paint onto individual aluminum panels; forming these murals. Using the imagery as their inspiration, four community poets, including an 11-year-old boy, created the written works. The survey data helped inform the three themes represented in these murals: (1) Past, Present, Future in the Arts Education, (2) Experiential Knowledge Working Together, and (3) Building Utah

### **Mormon Tabernacle Choir**

For an optional cultural activity, we highly recommend attending the Mormon Tabernacle Choir Broadcast, “Music and the Spoken Word,” which recently celebrated 80 years on the air. Only on **Sundays**. The Mormon Tabernacle Choir Broadcast is free of charge. Should you choose to attend, please meet a representative of the LDS Church Hosting Office at **Door 8 of the Conference Center by 9:00 a.m.** and identify yourself as an International Visitor with the Utah Council for Citizen Diplomacy.

Temple Square is approximately a **16-minute walk (0.7 mi)** from your hotel. Walk 4 blocks north on West Temple. The Conference Center is located on the corner of West Temple Street and North Temple Street.

Doors open at **8:30 a.m.** Guests must be seated in the Conference Center by 9:15 a.m., at which time the doors will be closed. Purses and small bags are permitted, but may be examined prior to entry to the building for security purposes. Photographs are welcome prior to and after the broadcast, but for copyright purposes are not allowed during the actual performance.

**Activity description:** You will have the opportunity to watch the Mormon Tabernacle Choir during a live performance.

### **Mormon Tabernacle Choir**

The 360 members of the Mormon Tabernacle Choir represent men and women from many different backgrounds and professions and range in age from 25 to 60. They reflect a medley of unique lives and experiences and are brought together by their love for singing and their faith. Their incomparable voices are the common chord that unites to form the choral group known all over the world as the Mormon Tabernacle Choir. The Choir has appeared at 13 world’s fairs and expositions, performed at the inaugurations of six U.S. presidents, and sung for numerous worldwide telecasts and special events. Five of the Choir's recordings have achieved “gold record” and two have achieved “platinum record” status. The most popular was the Grammy-Award-winning 1959 release of 'The Battle Hymn of the Republic' with the Philadelphia Orchestra.

### ***Music and the Spoken Word***

Today “Music and the Spoken Word” has become the world's longest-running continuous network broadcast and is carried on more than 2,000 radio and television stations and cable systems. It has been broadcast from locations across the country and around the world. Since its first broadcast, the program was an immediate success. The president of the radio network sent a telegram: “Your wonderful Tabernacle program is making great impression in New York. Have heard from leading ministers. All impressed by program. Eagerly awaiting your next.” The program was off and running. In 1954, to commemorate the 25th year of weekly Music and the Spoken Word broadcasts, Life magazine commented on the program's legacy with these words: “Those who know this program...need no arguments for listening to it. Millions have heard them, and more millions, we hope, will hear them in years to come. *We highly recommend you visit **Park City, Utah**. In Park City, we suggest you go to the **Utah Olympic Park** which houses world-class Olympic training facilities and both the Alf Engen Ski Museum and George S. and Dolores Doré Eccles 2002 Olympic Winter Games Museum. Admission is free for both museums. You may also explore **Park City's historic Main Street**, which reflects the city's history as a mining town as well as its current role as home to the Sundance Film Festival and a world-renown winter tourism destination. Driving to Park City takes **approximately 40 minutes**.*

*Another option for an outdoor activity is visiting **Antelope Island State Park**. Hike, mountain bike or horseback ride Antelope Island's backcountry trails for spectacular views of the Great Sale Lake and island scenery; stroll along sandy beaches and take a dip in the lake's salty waters or step back in time with a visit to the **Historic Fielding Garr Ranch**. Antelope Island is home to free-ranging bison, mule deer, bighorn sheep, pronghorn antelope, and many other desert animals. Millions of birds congregate along the shores surrounding the island, offering unparalleled opportunities for birding. Driving to Antelope Island takes **approximately 1 hour and 15 minutes**. If you choose this option, please be prepared to pay the approximate **\$10 entrance fee** for the group.*

The Natural History Museum of Utah houses the state's world-class collections in new exhibitions and offers more than 41,300 square feet of gallery and education space. The Natural History Museum of Utah is one of the leading scientific research and cultural institutions in the country. Established in 1963, the Museum's collections contain over 1.2 million objects and offers innovative exhibitions and educational programs to thousands of residents and visitors each year, including traveling and permanent exhibits, special events and other programs.

### **Park City and/or Olympic Park Tour**

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Long before Park City became a world class mountain resort and venue for the 2002 Olympic Winter Games, it was famous as a silver mining town, and boasts a lively and colorful past. Founded by prospectors in the late 1860's, Park City continued to mine silver until the early 1970's. The mining company, Park City Consolidated Mines, started the ski business in 1963, when they built the first lifts on what was then called Treasure Mountain. The Park City area now has three world class resorts: Park City Mountain Resort, Deer Valley Resort, and the Canyons Resort.

### **The Great Salt Lake**

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The Great Salt Lake is the largest natural lake west of the Mississippi River. At the current level the Great Salt Lake is approximately 75 miles long and about 35 miles wide. Located in several wide flat basins, a slight rise in water level expands the surface area of the lake considerably. The first scientific measurements were taken in 1849 and since then the lake level has varied by 20 feet, shifting the shoreline.

### **The Utah State Capitol**

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Sitting on top of the hill overlooking Salt Lake City is the remarkable Utah State Capitol building, home to the chambers and offices of the state government. When you visit the Utah State Capitol, you are greeted by history, fascinating artwork and stunning architecture. Designed by architect Richard K.A Kletting, it's a neoclassical building featuring distinguished Corinthian style columns, built between 1912 and 1916.
